Grade Weights

- Process (35%): Assignments in this category are designed to measure
 growth in ELA skills. These items do not show mastery, rather they show a
 consistent push toward growth. Examples of this include daily writing, and
 self evaluation, quarterly reader's workshop grades (which measures
 progress in independent reading), and frequent literary analysis pieces like
 article annotations and responses.
- Product (45 %): These assignments ar probably the most straight forward
 they require students to apply class concepts and evaluate their current
 understanding of the learning we are doing. Included in this are projects,
 tests, and papers.
- Participation (20%): Assignments in this category assess students for being present and attentive in class. Some examples are attendance, and participation, homeowork also falls under this category.

*Grades are available on PowerSchool. Please check this regularly and alert me of any issues with particular assignments. If you do not have a login please see the registrar.

Absentee Policy

Students who are absent from class are responsible for taking initiative to obtain their own makeup work. Students can check the "While You Were Out" binder for missing assignments. In addition, students can check with peers or teacher for any confusion, do not expect teacher to supply you with makeup work. Students have 1 day for each day absent to complete makeup work, any work remaining incomplete after this period will receive a zero.

Tardy: Students are expected to be in their seats and working on daily writing by the time the second bell rings. Failure to do so will result in a marking of tardy, which causes a loss of half of the day's attendance points.

E-submission policy: Assignments assigned prior to a student's absence will be due the day they return. Feel free to submit assignments via email/Google Docs. Further, internet and printer issues are not an excuse for missing deadlines, handwriting an assignment is always possible.

Note: Any assignments collected while absent will be marked as a zero until submitted.

Other Expectations

It is expected that students will use genuine, sincere, and fair means for the accomplishment of the tests, tasks, or projects from which evaluations of progress shall be determined. Students found plagiarizing, copying or cheating in any way will receive automatic zeros and have phone calls made to their parents. In addition, repeated offenses will result in a failing grade for the nine weeks or semester depending on the nature of the incident.

Students are expected to follow these basic rules.

- 1. Be prepared for class everyday.
- 2. Follow directions the first time.
- 3. Make informed choices.
- 4. Take personal responsibility.
- 5. Respect yourself, the classroom, and others.

Reading:

Students will have homework every night. Students are expected to read from independent or class assigned novels every night for a minimum of 20 minutes. This reading will be assessed monthly.

Bathroom:

Students are expected to use the rest room before school, at lunch, and during passing period. I understand there are emergencies, so each student will receive 3 bathroom passes per quarter.

Other Ways to Stay Connected

Google classroom: The class will be using Google Classroom this semester. Students will be able to take quizzes and submit written work via this platform. In addition, students (and/or parents) can receive class announcements and see a course calendar. Ask your student how to access this.

Course Outlook

This classroom works in a workshop model. That is a method of student-centered teaching that immerses students in a complex and indepth study of reading and writing with daily direct instruction as well as frequent 1:1 and/or small group instruction and intervention to differentiate for learners. This model focuses on student choice (in content of writing or reading) and frequent low stakes or no stakes practice. Below are two models of what a typical classroom day might look like.

A typical day with writing as the focus 54 minute class period:

- *6 minutes board read attendance taken and book talk
- *8 minutes read or write (small group 1:1 conferencing)
- *2 minutes sharing
- *15 minutes teacher directed notes/ text study
- *20 minutes practice/notebook work/drafting (small group 1:1 conferencing)
- *3 minutes clean up

Some Areas of Study*

A typical day with reading as the focus 54 minute class period

- *6 minutes board read attendance taken and book talk
- *8 minutes read or write (small group 1:1 conferencing)
- * 2 minutes sharing
- *5-10 minutes teacher reading strategy
- *30 minutes Reading (1:1 conferencing)
- * 3 minutes clean up

Novel Response: Students are expected to respond to one independent novel per quarter
