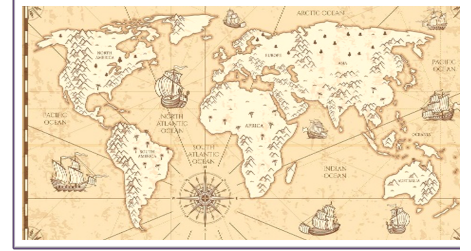

I hold high standards and expectations for my students because I know they have a great potential to grow and learn. My class is quite structured, and students will always be told what to expect and how to succeed in the course. I believe in building lessons and assessments for student success, but it is ultimately up to the student to follow through. I will be utilizing both Bloom's Taxonomy and Webb's Depth of Knowledge as resources to encourage higher order thinking skills. This includes starting lessons with basic recall and foundational material and then building activities to stretch their critical thinking and skills of synthesis of information. Students will be working on work posted on Google Classroom as well as turning in assignments via Classroom. We will review these procedures in class.

Class Materials

Because we will be utilizing technology so much for this class, you will need very minimal materials. When you come to school, please have the following:

- Fully charged laptop, if you have your own (we have limited outlets to charge computers)
- Personal earbuds—you will often need to watch a video independently
- A **pen or pencil** (we want to limit sharing classroom materials for health purposes) and a **highlighter** (color is your choice)
- A folder, binder, or notebook with folders to contain notes, etc.
- A water bottle—water fountains may not be available in the school
