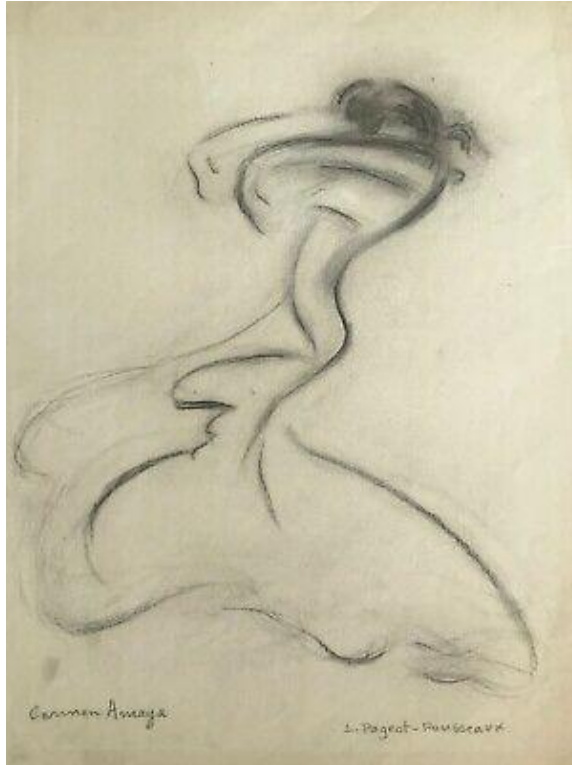

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## Course Description

Flamenco has been declared by the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to be an intangible cultural heritage of humanity.

Criteria for inscription on the Representative List of the Intangible Cultural Heritage of Humanity includes the following:

1. R.1: Flamenco is strongly rooted in its community, strengthening its cultural identity and continuing to be passed down from one generation to the next;
2. R.2: The inscription of Flamenco on the Representative List could raise awareness about intangible cultural heritage, while promoting human creativity and mutual respect among communities;
3. R.3: Ongoing and proposed measures demonstrate the concerted efforts of regional governments, institutions, NGOs, the communities and private persons to ensure Flamenco's safeguarding

Rooted in the Spanish Romani culture of Andalusia, Flamenco continues to thrive in New Mexico as a cultural phenomenon. Keeping in mind the rich cultural heritage of Flamenco and the necessary component of community, your Flamenco program aims to build bridges from the classroom to the community by creating opportunities to participate in an authentic Flamenco environment, both in and out of the classroom.
