Welcome to Algebra 1 S.Y. 2026 – 27!

Course Overview:

Algebra 1 is the foundation for all future high school math courses. This year, we will explore: solving equations and inequalities, linear functions and graphing, systems of equations, exponents and polynomials, quadratic functions, radical expressions and equations, data analysis and probability.

Course Objectives:

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Build the ability to use mathematical concepts, principles, and processes effectively.
- Strengthen problem-solving skills through application of algebraic reasoning.
- Introduce and reinforce mathematical symbolism in preparation for higher-level mathematics.

Key Principles:

- ✓ Everyone can learn math and the only way to *learn it* is to *do it*.
- ✓ Math is based in the real world. Everything around you is mathematics.
- ✓ There is more fun in learning math. There is no such thing as boring mathematics.
- ✓ Questions are important. Do not be afraid to ask. Explore to learn more.
- ✓ People learn from their mistakes, don't be afraid to make them.
- ✓ Try your best—even when it's hard.

What I Expect of Students:

- To come to class every day on time prepared to work and learn.
- To put forth maximum effort to be successful in the classroom and master the content.
- To participate actively in the lessons whether individually, in pairs or in groups.
- To adhere to all school rules in the classroom.
- To be kind, respectful, responsible, reliable, a role model.

What Students Can Expect of Me as a Teacher:

- To create a positive learning environment where all students feel safe to try new things, take risks and express themselves.
- To be fair and treat all students equally.
- To present content material in a manner that will allow all students to learn.
- To provide additional support in and outside of the classroom to ensure students could achieve mastery.

Required Materials (to bring every day):

1. **2 Pocket Folders** – to put worksheets and review packets.
2. **1 Spiral Notebook** – It is very important to take down notes.
3. **Pencils or Pens** – It is recommended to use pencils so that it is easier to correct mistakes.
4. **Chromebook** – for online work (Khan Academy, Google Classroom, etc.)

Materials Provided:

- ✓ **Calculator** – There's a calculator number designated for each student which will be used for the entire school year. Students are not allowed to use any other calculator number.
- ✓ **Textbook** – Math & You Algebra 2
 - ❖ Please note that all materials are being loaned and should remain in good condition. If you lose these materials or if they are damaged when it is time to return them, you will be charged the replacement cost.

Grading Breakdown:

20% - Homework/In-Class work (Worksheets)

20% - Quizzes

50% - Tests

10% - Bell Ringers/Exit Tickets/Participation/Notebook Checks

Semester 1 - 40% = 1st Quarter Grade; 40% = 2nd Quarter Grade; and 20% = semester final exam (70%)/MOY(20%)/Project(10%)

Semester 2 - 40% = 3rd Quarter Grade; 40% = 4th Quarter Grade; and 20% = year-long final exam (70%)/EOC(20%)/Project(10%)

Unit Test:

On a unit test, if a student scores:

- ✓ **Below 50%, students are required to retake.** (Students cannot earn a passing grade with ½ credit for corrections, if the grade is <20%, but <50% shows great need for reteach and retest of essential skills.)
- ✓ **Between 50-69%, they are required to either retake it or make corrections (their choice).**
 - If they choose to retake it, they keep the higher of the two grades between the original attempt and the new assessment.
 - If they choose to make corrections, they earn half of a point back for every point lost on the original assessment.
- ✓ **Between 70-79%, retake or corrections are optional by the student.**

- If they choose to retake it, they keep the highest grade between the original and the new assessment.
- If they choose to make corrections, they earn half of a point back for every point lost on the original assessment.

✓ **An 80% or higher, retake is optional** by the student. *Corrections for credit are not allowed.*

Any higher than 79% and students can earn A without actually demonstrating mastery.

Example: **(half of 80% is 40% + the 20% = 60%)**.

** Late work is accepted but penalized by 15% off the final assignment grade. If the work is more than one week late, the highest possible grade is 60%.*

** Tests will be announced several days in advance. Quizzes will be given periodically and maybe given at any time **unannounced** since they serve as an indicator of daily learning.*

**Students are expected to demonstrate mastery at 80% as math is a subject that builds on prior skills. If a student gets below 80% in quizzes/tests, he/she needs to retake the quiz/test.*

**If mastery is not demonstrated, students will participate in remediation to relearn the concepts and then retest over that standard/skill. It is remediated during Targeted Assistance during the school year.*

Absences:

If a student is absent on the day of a quiz or test, he or she must schedule the makeup for the next day. A student has one day for each excused day absent to make up missed assignments. If an assignment is due the day a student is absent, the assignment is due the day the student returns. For absences that exceed one day, the student will have at least as much time to do makeup work as the number of days of class absence. Excessive absences of 10 or more may result in a loss of credit for high school students.

Tardiness:

If a student arrives after the tardy bell has rung to begin the period, he/she will be considered tardy to class. If a student arrives 15 minutes late, this is considered Absence Unexcused Truant (AU). If the student has a pass, the pass should be given upon arrival to class.

Restroom:

One student at a time may use the restroom. Students are given a PANDA Student Pass. If a student is out for more than five minutes, office staff will be notified.

Electronics Policy:

In accordance with **Senate Bill 11 (2025)** and guidance from the **New Mexico Public Education Department (PED)**, Public Academy for Performing Arts (PAPA) has adopted the following procedures to reduce distractions and promote a safe, focused, and respectful learning environment.

Definition of Wireless Communication Devices

A wireless communication device is any portable electronic device capable of transmitting voice, text, or data, including but not limited to:

1. Cell phones and smartphones
2. Smartwatches

3. Tablets
4. Laptop computers
5. Gaming devices
6. Wireless headphones

Student Expectations

- ✓ Wireless communication devices must be **silenced and kept out of sight** (such as in a backpack or locker) from arrival on campus until the dismissal bell.
- ✓ Students may **not use, display, or access** wireless communication devices during the school day unless **explicitly authorized** by a teacher or school administrator for an educational purpose.

Exceptions:

Students may use a wireless communication device during instructional time only when:

- Required for a documented medical need or care plan.
- Authorized by school personnel during an emergency.

Consequences for Unauthorized Use

- ✓ Students using a wireless communication device without permission will be required to surrender the device to the front office, where it must be picked up by a parent or guardian.
- ✓ Students may also be required to secure their device in a **locked cell phone pouch** for the remainder of the school day. The pouch may only be unlocked in the front office after dismissal.
- ✓ Refusal to comply with staff directions regarding wireless communication devices will be addressed according to the school's **Behavior Matrix**, including consequences for defiance and disruption of the educational process.
- ✓ Tampering with or damaging a locked cell phone pouch will result in:
 - o Financial responsibility for the cost of replacing the pouch.
 - o Additional disciplinary consequences for destruction of school property, interference with instruction, and defiance.

Parent/Guardian Communication

Parents and guardians who need to communicate with their student during the school day should contact the **school's front office**. Students who need to contact a parent or guardian during school hours must do so through the front office with permission from school staff. This procedure helps ensure the safety of all students while minimizing disruptions to teaching and learning.

Dismissal:

Students should remain in their seats until the bell rings. Ensure that desks and chairs are in their original position; keeping the area neat and clean.

Discipline Procedure:

Failure to adhere to school rules in the classroom will result in appropriate disciplinary action. Please review the Student Handbook for further details regarding discipline and the school's attendance policy.
